



## AREA 5 PONY CLUB WINTER LEAGUE SHOW JUMPING OBJECTIVE AND RULES

Updated 27.8.22 Final

### 1. Objective of the Competition

- 1.1 The objective is to provide an inter-branch team and individual show jumping competition (Winter League Show Jumping WLSJ) for all Branches in Area 5, from September to March. Referred to below as the "Season", in five jumping height classes, involving as many Area 5 members as possible. Providing a framework to encourage a competitive spirit, continuous and consistent improvement in riding ability.
- 1.2 The Season will be deemed to have started with the commencement of the first competition.
- 1.3 An Area 5 WLSJ secretary will be appointed by the Area 5 Winter League Committee prior to the commencement of the Season. The secretary shall be responsible for compiling and updating the league table after each competition and publishing the results.

### 2. The Competition

- 2.1 The Competition will comprise five classes:

Class 1 Starters	- 60cm - age restriction 9 and under;
Class 2 Mini	- 70cm - age restriction 11 and under;
Class 3 Novice	- 80cm - no age restriction;
Class 4 Intermediate	- 90cm - no age restriction;
Class 5 Open	- 100cm - no age restriction

(The heights given are the heights in Section A, Section B may increase by a maximum of 10cm).
- 2.2 The Organising Branch/Branches may offer additional Classes, such as Open (i.e no age restrictions) Classes for Class 1 and 2, or Barrier Spring Festival Show Jumping Classes [sfsj-rules-engwal-2023.pdf \(pcuk.org\)](#) These Classes will not form a part of the WLSJ Competition. The Schedule must detail what rules these classes are to be run under.
- 2.3 The WLSJ will be run under the Pony Club Show Jumping Rules as at the beginning of the Season, and as described in paragraph 287 of the British Show Jumping Rules 2022.
- 2.4 The course is divided into two sections jumped, as one round. The first Section A will either be untimed or have a time allowed. The second Section B will be timed.

Faults will be cumulative over the whole course and riders will jump the whole course, unless they are eliminated. Those placed equal on faults will be decided by the time in the second Section B. The course may comprise up to 13 obstacles (combinations = 1 obstacle) in total, with up to 7 in Section A untimed (6 minimum) and up to 6 in Section B timed (5 minimum) (where the arena allows a longer course may be used, but Section A should include no more than 13 obstacles and Section B no more than 7 obstacles).

### 3. Team and Individual Entry Qualification

- 3.1 Team entry to the WLSJ is open to any Area 5 Branch whether or not the Branch organises a competition during the Season.
- 3.2 Individual entry to the WLSJ is open to all Area 5 Branch members.
- 3.3 Area 5 Branches may be permitted to organise a WLSJ competition, in conjunction with another Branch(es) with the approval of the Area 5 WL Committee. Such arrangement to be agreed before the start of the Season, or at such later time as the Area 5 WL Committee agree.

### 4. Teams

- 4.1 A Team will comprise a minimum of three and a maximum of four members of that Branch(es).
- 4.2 A Branch may only enter one "Winter League Team" in each Class, with any other Team/Teams being a "non-Winter League Team".
- 4.3 Where a Branch enters more than one Team they must, at entry stage, nominate which is their WL Team. Where a Branch combines with another Branch(es) to co-organise a competition these Branches may also enter a Combined WL Team, as well as a Branch WL Team.

- 4.4 Members from different Branches may combine to form a WL Team, with the approval of the Area 5 WL Committee, subject to the arrangement being agreed before the start of the Season, or at a later time as the Area 5 WL Committee agree, to be known as a Combined WL Team.
- 4.1 Teams, and Team members, are to be detailed on the entry form.
- 4.2 Team members may be substituted from members entered in the competition, subject to the notification of the change to the Organiser, prior to the commencement of the Class (a Class is deemed to have commenced, when the first rider has entered the arena for that Class).

## **5. Team Members**

Any Area 5 Branch member is eligible to be a member of a Team subject to the following conditions:

- 5.1 They must be a member of the Branch in whose Team they compete or, where the team is a Combined Team, they must be a member of one of the Branches.
- 5.2 Horses and members must have attended a minimum of three rallies/qualifying coaching/training sessions since the 1<sup>st</sup> January of the year in which the Season commenced.
- 5.3 At a competition a horse may only compete in one Winter League Team unless, for example, where two family members genuinely share the same horse. In such case an exemption may be granted by the Area 5 Representative, subject to the DC detailing the information and submitting such a request, in writing, by close of entries for the competition.
- 5.4 A Team member may compete in different Classes, at different competitions, during a Season.
- 5.5 A member may not compete for another Area 5 Branch in a WL Team in the same Season.
- 5.6 Where a Branch has only two members entered in the Class, and therefore does not have a WL Team in the Class, the Branch may include one combination of horse/rider, who is a member of a WL Team from the Class below to make a WL Team (i.e to make a Team of three). The results for the combination, who is included, will only be counted for the Team score, their score will be ignored any individual results.

For the avoidance of doubt, at any competition:

- 5.7 The combination of horse/rider may compete in more than one Class, but the 2<sup>nd</sup> or subsequent class(es) must be as an Individual, or as a member of a non-WL Team (subject to clause 5.3 and 5.6).
- 5.8 Members may ride more than one horse in the same Class, but they must nominate which is their WL horse in that Class prior to the start of the competition and must ride that horse first.

## **6. Organisation of Competitions**

- 6.1 Organisers are encouraged to organise the competition so as to allow Individuals and non-WL Teams to compete.
- 6.2 If a competition is over-subscribed resulting in some entries having to be refused, the Organiser must give priority to WL teams, over non-WL teams and Individuals, provided the entries have been received prior to the entry closing date.
- 6.3 Course changes, between all Classes, should be such as so to provide a "substantial different" course (NB the addition of a single obstacle, without altering the route of the course itself, would not be sufficient to make the course "substantially different").

### **Mixed Teams**

- 6.4 The Organiser may place members, who are not in a Team, into non-WL Teams at their absolute discretion.

### **Order of Jumping**

- 6.5 In the first Class, the Team representing the host Branch(es) will jump first. In the later Classes this may be reversed, so those Teams who have further to travel jump earlier.
- 6.6 In all Classes WL Teams should jump first, followed by any non-WL Teams and then Individuals.

## **7. Results and WL Points**

- 7.1 The result of the Individual competition will be decided upon the total number of faults incurred in the two sections. The combination, horse and rider, with the least number of faults being the winner. In the event of equality of faults, the least time taken to complete the timed section will be the deciding factor.
- 7.2 The result of the Team competition will be decided upon the total number of faults incurred by three members. The Team with the least number of faults being the winner. In the event of equality of faults incurred, the least time taken to complete the timed section by the three members, whose faults were counted in that round, will be the deciding factor.
- 7.3 WL Teams and WL Individuals, placed first to sixth in each Class, will be awarded WL points on a descending scale of six points for first place, and one point for sixth place.  
When awarding WL Team points, should a WL Team be placed below a non-WL Team, for the purpose of awarding points the non-WL Team should be ignored.
- 7.4 The Organiser shall publish the results of each Class in writing or use live scoring, such as Pony Club Results. Where results are displayed in writing a full list of riders, faults incurred and provisional placings are to be available on a noticeboard, where they can be seen at least 15 minutes prior to the presentation for that Class, to allow time for objections to be made and/or errors to be corrected.
- 7.5 The Organiser shall appoint, if required, a Jury of Appeal consisting of the District Commissioner of the organising Branch(es), one of the judges and the Area 5 Representative. If the Area Representative is not present then the DC of a visiting Branch not directly involved in the appeal, may be invited to join the Jury.
- 7.6 Protests and Objections will, as far as possible and consistent with these Rules, be dealt with under the relevant paragraph of the Pony Club Show Jumping Rules.
- 7.7 The Organiser shall, within three days of the Competition, post the results on Pony Club Results and shall send a copy of the results to the Area 5 website and the WLSJ secretary.

## **8. Awarding of Rosettes**

- 8.1 In each Class, for both Teams and Individuals, rosettes are to be awarded to 6<sup>th</sup> place.
- 8.2 Each Class shall be deemed to be a single Team competition, involving WL and non-WL Teams, and non-WL Teams will be eligible for the award of rosettes (although non-WL Teams will not be awarded points).
- 8.3 In each Class an Individual competition will run alongside the Team competition. All combinations entered in the Class will be eligible for the award of rosettes.
- 8.4 At the final competition of the Season rosettes, will be awarded to the Teams and Individuals in each Class, who are placed 1<sup>st</sup> to 4<sup>th</sup>, based upon the total number of points accumulated during the Season.

## **9. Competition Dates and Other Classes**

- 9.1 Competition dates will be agreed at the Area and Branch DC's meeting ahead of the Season and will be published on the Area 5 website. Clashes with other Area or Branch competitions should be avoided. This is to ensure that entries are maximised at every competition through the Season.
- 9.2 The organising Branch(es) is/are responsible for arranging a suitable venue.
- 9.3 The Area 5 WL Committee will, prior to the commencement of the Season, agree the Winter League Schedule, to include Classes and entry fees.

## **10. Organisation of Competitions**

- 10.1 The Organiser is responsible for all Health and Safety issues at the competition and should take all reasonable precautions to ensure the health and safety of everyone present. All members, and others attending, must take reasonable steps to avoid and prevent accidents and must obey the instructions of the organisers, officials and stewards.
- 10.2 The Organiser must carry out a risk assessment before the commencement of the competition and Organisers should issue a disclaimer of liability, both prior to, and at the competition.
- 10.3 Any member who is riding a horse or pony which is considered by the organiser, an official or steward to be unsafe in any respect, either for that rider or for any other person present, or any person who is acting in any way which is considered unsafe, should be spoken to discreetly and, if appropriate, prevented from taking any further part in that competition and may be asked to leave the venue.
