Gate into the arena must be closed to prevent loose horses reaching a public road. When not being ridden horses will be tied to a fixed point - this must be a lorry tie ring or a trailer tie ring. Trailers must be hitched onto a vehicle. 	 All attendees must be aware to attempt to prevent a loose horse reaching the road if a shout of 'LOOSE HORSE' is heard.
