

C+ STANDARD PART 2: HORSE AND PONY CARE

OBJECTIVES

- To understand the importance of putting equine welfare first at all times
- To understand how the Five Domains affect the care of ponies and horses
- To know how the behaviour of a pony or horse is affected by its environment
- To understand how horses and ponies learn from previous experience
- To show practical experience, or understanding and knowledge, of the care and work of a stabled horse/pony
- To show practical experience and/or understanding and knowledge of the care and work of a pony or horse at grass

SAFETY (Dismounted discussion)

- 1. Explain how you would keep yourself safe when working alone with ponies/horses
- 2. Outline your responsibilities towards others to keep them safe when you are working on the same yard
- 3. Explain how you should behave to keep ponies/horses safe in stables and on the yard
- 4. List features of safe and unsafe yard environments

WELFARE RESPONSIBILITIES (Dismounted discussion)

- 5. Talk about the mental and physical effects on ponies and horses of:
 - a. Not having anything to eat for more than 4 hours
 - b. Being unable to touch other ponies and horses
 - c. Being kept in a stable most of the time
- 6. Explain how you could minimise the amount of time that a stabled pony or horse is without food overnight (whilst ensuring that it did not become overweight)
- 7. Talk about things you can do to make time in the stable more enjoyable for ponies and horses

TRAINING PONIES AND HORSES (Dismounted discussion)

- 8. Give one example of how you would use positive reinforcement (rewards food, scratching) when handling ponies/horses on the ground
- 9. Give one example of how you would use negative reinforcement (pressure and release) when handling ponies/horses on the ground
- 10. Discuss the equine flight response; give an example of an event that might induce the flight response and suggest how this could be avoided in a yard environment
- 11. Give an example of how you could get a pony or horse used to a procedure (desensitisation)
- 12. Discuss the equine herd instinct; give an example of when this might be a problem in the yard environment and how you might avoid it
- 13. Describe some of the ways that a pony/horse might stand that could indicate that it is in pain
- 14. Describe some obvious behaviours that might indicate a pony is stressed
- 15. Explain the importance of timing and consistency when correcting a pony's/horse's mistake
- 16. Explain the importance of monitoring stress when correcting a pony's mistakes/training

MANAGEMENT OF HORSES AND PONIES

- 17. Talk about the care and different methods of keeping a pony/horse permanently at grass
- 18. Discuss the care and exercise of a horse or pony that's fully or partially stabled
- 19. Talk about keeping the stable environment clean and tidy

FEEDING

- 20. Discuss ponies'/horses' need for fresh water
- 21. Discuss the importance of forage in the diet
- 22. Know the differences between hay, haylage, and other forages
- 23. Discuss different methods of providing hay to horses/ponies
- 24. Explain how you would select a feed for a pony/horse
- 25. Explain how you would prepare different feeds (e.g. sugar beet)
- 26. Discuss how feeding would differ between a stabled pony/horse and one kept at grass

GROOMING, BANDAGING, AND TRAVEL

- 27. Know which items are important to be in a grooming kit and use them effectively
- 28. Discuss the advantages and disadvantages of washing horses and ponies, and know how to do this correctly
- 29. Discuss when trimming might be required, which parts of the pony/horse you would trim and which parts you would not trim.
- 30. Put on a stable bandage
- 31. Show how you would check the fit of a rug, adjusting straps if necessary.
- 32. Prepare a horse or pony for travel, including rugs, travel boots or bandages, tail bandage, and tail guard
- 33. Load and unload a horse or pony into a trailer or horse box

FOOT AND SHOEING

- 34. Explain the reasons for trimming and shoeing ponies'/horse's feet
- 35. Describe a general purpose shoe
- 36. Describe a well cared for foot (shod or unshod)
- 37. Discuss whether the horse/pony presented needs reshoeing
- 38. Know the names and uses of the farrier's tools
- 39. Name the external and internal parts of the foot

TACK

- 40. Fit (and adjust if necessary) a saddle, bridle, and running martingale; inspect for safety
- 41. Recognise a variety of bits that are allowed in Pony Club activities
- 42. Explain the action(s) of the bit you normally ride in

HEALTH AND FIRST AID

- 43. Recognise when a horse or pony is lame
- 44. Know horses and ponies' normal resting respiration rate and show how to take it
- 45. Recognise symptoms of illness
- 46. Know what might cause colic
- 47. Estimate the body condition (fat) score of a named horse, using the 0–5 scale for fat scoring
- 48. State whether the body condition (fat) score is healthy or unhealthy
- 49. Know when to call the vet and what information to give
- 50. Know how to care for a wound until the vet arrives
- 51. Know how to cool the legs of a horse or pony after hard work

ENVIRONMENT

- 52. Explain four ways in which horse owners and carers can reduce their carbon hoofprints and footprints
- 53. Consider how you can reduce your horse-related waste by reducing, reusing, and recycling
- 54. Understand how to manage horse-related waste responsibly

- All content covered in lower tests may be reassessed in this test
- The items shown in bold are particularly important; competence in these items will be given emphasis by the assessor when considering the result
- D, D+ and C Test Care must be achieved before taking the C+ Care. If a member is over 16 years, following assessment they may enter directly at C+ level.
