2020—What a Year!

After 4 months of no activity, it was great to see so many of our members out enjoying their horses and ponies again.

As the months go by, it is becoming evident that this terrible virus will be with us for some time yet but we will continue to organise as many activities for our members as it is safe for us to do. I would like to thank the Committee, our Coaches and all our Parents for their continued help and support throughout these challenging times!

Rally Report

Sadly the report won't be as extensive this year as in previous years due to the 4 month gap in the Spring when Covid 19 prevented us from holding any activities. However, as soon as we were able to, we resumed Pony Club activities. We've managed to hold rallies in many different disciplines, games, working rallies, show jumping, arena cross country, outdoor cross country, dressage and horse & pony care/test training. These have been very well attended and enjoyed by all age groups within the branch.

The Pony Club in this Country is split up into 19 areas, North Shropshire Branch is one of 17 branches within Area 7 which stretches from the Welsh border over to Northampton and south to Warwickshire. Each Area holds qualifying competitions for a wide variety of disciplines, both mounted and un-mounted to qualify to compete at The Pony Club Championships in August at Cholmondeley Castle.

Area Competitions 2021 - Important Information:

If you wish to be considered for any of the area competitions in 2021 please make sure that you and the horse/pony you intend to ride at the competitions have attended 3 rallies. If you attended 2020 summer camp that counts as 1 rally. All rallies after 1st July 2020 count towards the 2021 eligibility, but at least 1 rally must be in 2021. Team training and practice sessions do not count towards this. Helen Elston will once again be collecting the area reply slips from those who wish to be considered and the slips will be available on the website early next year.

The Spring Festival

The Pony Club Spring Festival has evolved from the Winter Series and includes Dressage, Show Jumping and now Arena Eventing. Riders will compete to qualify for the Spring Festival Championships, it will be one of the main sporting events in the Pony Club calendar!

For 2020/2021 the Spring Festival will be split into two regions with two separate finals with the England and Wales Final at Arena UK 9th/10th/11th April 2021. We hope this will give everyone a really good chance of successfully making their way to their final.

Please be reassured that any competitions that have been arranged under the Winter Series rules will automatically be included in the Spring Festival 2021.

Qualifying Stages

There will be up to three stages of the Spring Festival depending on sport and region.

England and Wales:

1. **Preliminary Rounds** for Dressage, Show Jumping and Arena Eventing are held between August and March to enable competitors to qualify for their Area Competition.

2. **Area Competitions** for Dressage, Show Jumping and Arena Eventing will be held in March for those who qualified at a Preliminary Round.

3. Those who were successful at their Area Competition will go forward to the **Championships**.

Taking the AH Test by Gregor Montgomery

As some of you will know, I undertook my AH Test in September, passing 3 of the 4 sections. It was a different format throughout the training and the test this year. Almost all of the Area 7 Organised our training was online, with two sessions of Face-to-Face training with Nicola Fitter at her yard, to practise the lunging and ride and lead. All the rest of the sessions, once a week for about 2monthS, were a zoom call with Nicola running through a set of questions she had sent us, looking at our answers and then explaining the right answers. It worked really well and meant that we could do training in the evenings and we could all answer the questions by ourselves which allowed you to see the gaps in your knowledge better. I also used the online training that Area 19 (Scotland) put on, which was also very useful. This was the distinct advantage of everything being online, as I could access their course, which under normal circumstances I couldn't have done. Their course was very different from Area 7 as they put on specialist AH talks undertaken by a vet, nutritionist, eventer etc.

The Test was a couple of weeks into September and I travelled down to Warwickshire for it. Because of COVID-19, the test was run slightly differently, where you would normally be in groups, you did the test one to one with examiners with slightly shorter sections to give everyone enough time. This meant that you had nowhere to hide, and you couldn't hope for the other person to answer, however because the training had been done in a similar way, it meant I was used to it and thus I was able to perform well through most of the test. The test was well organised, and the examiners were really good.

I was disappointed to discover I had only passed 3 of the 4 sections, mostly because I although I would have been happy with to have passed just one section, passing the 3 sections was annoyingly close. I was even more disappointed to find out that I had failed the fourth section because I bandaged the wrong way around the leg, which just goes to show that whatever you do, don't forget the basics of your Pony Care.

The instructors made it all fun even when quite do what we asked!


