Newsletter November 2018

Next year the North Shropshire Pony Club will be celebrating its 90th Anniversary. The Pony Club started on 1st November 1929 and the North Shropshire was one of the 10 original branches. It was started by The Institute of the Horse in order to have a Junior Branch of their organisation and would be known as The Pony Club: "for the purpose of interesting young people in riding and sport and at the same time offering the opportunity of higher instruction in this direction than many of them can obtain individually".

Under the new scheme, the country was divided into districts, each under a District Commissioner, and helped by a Local Committee. Members joined at an entrance fee of 2s 6d (around 12.5p in today's money), which remained unchanged until 1976, and an annual subscription of 5s (c.25p). A Membership badge was given, the pattern of which is virtually the identical to the badge used today.

The District Commissioner of The North and South Shropshire (a combined club at the time) was Mrs Hugh Corbett (later Mrs. Victor Hurst). In 1932 an official Pony Club tie was created and Pony Club Tests were started and efficiency certificates given.

The Pony Club Office has asked us if we can send them information on the club, such as:

- Any interesting history of the branch
- The Names of members in 1929, and any information on what these members went on to do / are doing today
- involvement of the original members in the Pony Club now, including any family members involved with the branch today
- Major successes of previous / current North Shropshire members
- Any past photos, newspaper articles, stories, interesting facts etc, and anything that generally helps show the history of the branch

I appreciate it might be difficult to find things from years ago, but any information would be great! We would also like to throw a celebratory event for the club in recognition of our 90th anniversary, if anyone has any suggestions, or would like to get involved in organising, we welcome all ideas.

Now onto the present day ... Another great year for the club, which can be seen on the following pages.

We have been active in a very broad range of disciplines, with successes across all levels, and I send a massive thank you to everyone who has contributed throughout the year. We have also had a great year for test results from E level up to AH, with Lucy Lloyd Brown winning the prestigious Pony Club Golden Jubilee Trophy (presented by Colonel AG Stewart in 1979) for best Area 7 AH candidate.

We also have lots to look forward to next year. The North Shropshire is hosting Area 7 Dressage at Berriewood (please do let us know if you are available to help!). We have some very exciting news for Senior Camp 2019, which will now be held at Berriewood, with Junior Camp being kindly hosted again by the Bryers family at Merryfields (a big thank you to them from all the juniors members).

It's at this time of year that I also reflect on the significant level of time commitment the club has received over the past 12 months, and I personally want to say a special thanks to all the committee members, I know how much time and effort you all put in to club to make it such the success, all of which is very much appreciated. I would like to extend my thanks to the parents and families of our members, for all your support and dedication to the club. Last but not least, I want to thank all the members, whether it is at rallies, horse and pony care, or competitions around the country, you all do our club proud!

Finally, to close my note this year, I would like to thank Mr Robin Thompson for his long standing support of the club. This year Mr Thompson will be stepping down as our President and we warmly welcome Mrs Jo Grandfield into the President's role.

Area Competitions

North Shropshire has once again enjoyed a successful year with a significant number of members competing in Area competitions, with some qualifying to compete at National and Regional Championships.

The year started with Alasdair Montgomery qualifying for the National Winter Triathlon finals in Milton Keynes in March finishing well.

Also in February we entered two teams in the Area 7 Quiz qualifier. Both teams did really well finishing 2nd and 4th.

March saw the area finals of the Dengie dressage and show jumping and we had a number of competitors representing the Branch. To compete at the area final, members have to qualify, which they can do at various local venues. We didn't have any qualifiers for the national finals this year but everyone did very well.

In April we had a junior and two senior teams competing in the Area Horse and Pony Care qualifier. There were teams from all over Area 7 competing with our teams doing exceptionally well. The seniors finished in 2nd and 4th with our junior team finishing 9th.

The mounted games team went to Area in May and had a great time. They came 2nd in the tack and turnout and 4th in the competition.

July saw us fielding a number of teams at the Area 7 dressage qualifier, held again this year at Wolverhampton Racecourse. We were well represented by two intermediate teams (6th and 8th), a novice team and two regional teams, both of which finished 8th. Individual placings included Hannah Chappell who finished 2nd in her arena and qualified and two regional qualifiers of Jess Bryers and Euan Montgomery.

At the end of July we were represented by a number of teams at the area eventing qualifier at Offchurch Bury where we had an intermediate team which finished 3rd and qualified for

championships consisting of Alice Parton, Alasdair Montgomery (who was unable to compete at championships), Anna Warner and Emily Yeomans. We also had a novice team that came 8th with Bella Jackson (1st in arena and best dressage) and Darcie Connacher (3rd in her arena) both securing qualification. Two teams competed at regional level with one team qualifying (Phoebe Cambray, Amelia Farmer, Bella Timmis and Jemima Warner) and one individual (Rufus Farmer).

On 1 August we fielded a number of teams at the Area 7 show jumping qualifier at Solihull Riding Club. As the ground was very hard, all levels jumped on a surface which made for quite a long day. The Branch was represented by an intermediate team along with an individual, two novice teams and three regional teams competing throughout the day. We were really unlucky not to gain team qualification at novice and intermediate levels, both teams finishing fourth. Special congratulations must go to our members who qualified as individuals - Anna Warner at intermediate level finishing 3rd and Annabelle Wixey and Jess Horne who finished 5th and 8th respectively at novice level both qualifying. Our regional teams did well with one finishing 9th and

Bella Timmis qualifying as an individual. We also did well in the tack and turnout competitions with our intermediate team coming 4th, a novice team 4th and a regional team 2nd.

We enjoyed supporting all our competitors at both national pony club championships and regional championships where everyone did well and were a credit to the Branch.

Grace Jackson (individual), Bella Jackson and Dee Edwards (pairs) competed in the dressage to music with Dee and Bella finishing 5th.



At the regional eventing championships the team finished 7th and Bella Timmis was a brilliant 3rd individually. As usual, we sent a show jumping team to represent the Branch at the Shrewsbury Flower Show (Dee Edwards, Bella Jackson, Grace Jackson and Emily Yeomans) and did really well.

For the second year running, we sent a team to compete in the arena eventing competition at Blenheim. This was an exciting experience for all our competitors having the opportunity to compete at such a prestigious event. The team did very well and had an enjoyable day out.

Congratulations to everyone and a big thank you to all parents for their continued support!

The Pony Club in this Country is split up into 19 areas, North Shropshire Branch is one of 17 branches within Area 7 which stretches from the Welsh border over to Northampton and south to Warwickshire. Each Area holds qualifying competitions for a wide variety of disciplines, both mounted and un-mounted to qualify to compete at The Pony Club Championships in August at Cholmondeley Castle. Very recently a new introductory level has established for dressage, show jumping and eventing called the Landrover Regional Competition. Qualifiers for this are held at the various Area competitions with those who qualify competing at a regional championship, which, this year for Area 7, was at Eland Lodge.

Area Competitions 2019 - Important Information:

If you wish to be considered for any of the area competitions in 2019 please make sure that you and the horse/pony you intend to ride at the competitions have attended 3 rallies. If you attended 2018 summer camp that counts as 1 rally. All rallies after 1st July 2018 count towards the 2019 eligibility, but at least 1 rally must be in 2019. Team training and practice sessions do not count towards this. Helen Elston will once again be collecting the area reply slips from those who wish to be considered and the slips will be available on the website early next year.

Young Equestrian Leader Awards By Gregor Montgomery



For those who aren't familiar with the YELA awards, they are designed to encourage young people (14-25 years) to volunteer and gain leadership skills within the equestrian sector. There are 3 levels of award – bronze, silver and gold, each with increasing hours of volunteering and with additional member bodies.

I completed my silver award in 2016 and decided to continue with my gold award. This involves volunteering for a minimum of 60 hours with 3 different member bodies, over at least 32 weeks. During the last 1½ years I have helped at many pony club rallies, junior camp, horse and pony care sessions, mounted games etc and I helped with the Riding for the Disabled Association (RDA) holidays, which is where disabled riders go to a riding centre for a week's holiday and I have also done pole picking at British Show jumping competitions. There is a requirement with the gold award to run a project to benefit one of the member bodies. I have recently submitted my gold award paperwork (there are questions to

answer, as well as writing up about your volunteering activities and a presentation to be done for gold), so will hopefully receive the award soon. I would thoroughly recommend anyone aged 14 or over to join up as it is great fun helping younger children at rallies/camp and through helping with the RDA, I realised how much they get out of riding and horses, and it was great to be able to help them.

Earlier this year, we sent a team of riders to Blenheim International Horse Trials to compete in the pony club section of the event there. Originally Alice was to have been in the team, but 2 days before competition, her horse was unwell so Darcie stepped in her place and we were all very grateful that she did, as with all team competitions it's much better to have a team of 4 than the pressure of being in a team of 3, so the team that competed on the day comprised of myself, Anna, Darcie and Dee. It was a team effort getting all the riders and horses to the competition. Dee and Darcie travelled together and my horse went with Anna's, whilst I had to fly down as I had started university that week, so left Scotland at 5am and was collected from Birmingham airport and then driven on to meet my horse at Blenheim.

We were entered into the 100cm class, and due to the nature of this aspect of the competition, it being an limited entry event which is oversubscribed, we felt quite lucky and honoured to have been felt to be good enough to come back and compete again. The day was lovely, with good ground conditions, and as the competition was all in one small grass arena, the good conditions were needed to cope with all the people who would be tracing out the same course for the whole day. The atmosphere is great, as over the road from our arena is the dressage phase of the main event, and there is the shopping village and all the other attractions of a such a prestigious competition. The pony club classes are sponsored by Dodson and Horrell so on arrival we were given a complimentary bucket, feed mixer and a baseball cap. We were luckily placed after the lunch break, so we had time to walk the course before going back and tacking up. Thankfully Helen came to walk the course with us and gave an incredible amount of help there and in the warmup. The course was lengthy and technical and had two distinct phases as per the format of the competition, a show jumping phase at the beginning, for about nine jumps, and then immediately around the corner and into a cross country section, with some difficult lines and turns for several more jumps, to end on a cheekily placed uphill upright show jump at the end, which was the most knocked down fence of the day. Helen gave us a lot of help and advice on how to negotiate some of the trickier turns and jumps they had placed in the arena, but for the most part it seemed to flow as a course.

Getting inside the time was a challenge for all competitors throughout the day, and we all did fairly well, achieving respectable times. None of us had a disastrous round, though unfortunately none of us managed a clear as we all had either a missed line or accidental pole down. However we were all pleased by our rounds as clears were few and far between throughout the whole day. As a team we weren't placed, but weren't holding up the bottom of the table either. After the horses had been put away we were able to walk the cross country course for the 3* that was going on over the duration of the same weekend. It was good fun to see the jumps and theorise about the course and work out the optimal line, pacing, and striding. Besides that, the atmosphere created by everything and everyone else at the event was wonderful, we all had a great time, and hopefully they will want us to come back again next year.
