

# **Area Competitions**

Once again, North Shropshire has had a successful year with a significant number of members competing in Area competitions, some qualifying to compete at National and Regional Championships.

The year started with a number of members competing at the Area 7 triathlon qualifier in February all doing really well, some achieving personal bests and having lots of fun.

In March we entered a team consisting of Hannah Chappell, Kitty Ing, Euan and Finlay Montgomery in the Area 7 Quiz qualifier which came a very creditable 2nd. The parent/supporter's team of Claire Ing and Rachel Montgomery also did very well finishing 2nd!

Also in March saw the area finals of the Dengie dressage winter league with Kitty Ing finishing in 9th place in her section.

In April we had a senior team consisting on Hannah Chappell, Kitty Ing and Lucy Lloyd-Brown which competed in the Area Horse and Pony Care qualifier. There were teams from all over Area 7 taking part and our team narrowly missed out on qualification finishing in 2nd place.

The Area Mounted Games qualifier took place in May at Dallas Burston. We sent a Junior and Senior Team with our Senior Team finishing in 8th place and a third place prize for tack and turnout. Juniors came 6th and 2nd in the tack and turnout.

In June we sent a number of teams and individuals to the show jumping qualifier at Solihull Riding Club. Our intermediate team of Grace Jackson, Bella Jackson, Alice Parton and Anna Warner came 2nd and qualified for Championships. There were individual placings at intermediate with Grace coming 6th and Bella 8th. The team also proved that they can turn themselves and their horses out to a high standard

as they also won the tack and turnout competition. In the novice section our team of Dee Edwards, Euan Montgomery, Gregor Montgomery and Annabelle Wixey came 5th in a big field of competitors and 10th in the tack and turnout competition. Euan did really well coming 2nd and qualifying as an individual for Championships. Dora Prytherch also did well at regional level qualifying for the Regional Championships.

July was a busy month for qualifiers. At the beginning of the month we were represented by a number of teams/individuals at the area eventing qualifier at

Offchurch Bury. We had an intermediate team of Grace
Jackson, Alice Parton, Anna Warner and Emily Yeomans which finished brilliantly
in 1st place and qualified for Championships. In their sections, Alice finished 1st,
Emily and Grace were both 3rd and Anna was 8th in her section. Alasdair
Montgomery competed as an individual finishing 5th in his section and also
qualifying. We also had a novice team that came 8th consisting of Dee Edwards,
Bella Jackson, Euan Montgomery and Annabelle Wixey, with Euan being placed

4th individually. We had two regional teams, one finishing 10th and the other 12th out of a considerable number of teams. Individual placings saw Dora Prytherch finishing 1st on one of her horses and 7th on the other qualifying both of them for Regional Championships and Bella Timmis finished individually in 9th place also qualifying.

In mid July we were well represented at the Tetrathlon qualifier held at Whitfield Farm, Ettington. In the boy's class, Alasdair and Gregor Montgomery both came 3rd in the open and intermediate classes respectively. The intermediate girls team of Darcie Connacher, Anna Warner, Georgie Wixey and Kaitlyn Wynn came 1st in area 7 and qualified to join Gregor and Alasdair at Championships.

On the 20th July we hosted the Area 7 dressage qualifier at Berriewood. We were well represented at all levels. Bella Jackson was individually 10th in the open and qualified. The intermediate team of Dee Edwards, Grace Jackson and Anna Warner (sadly Emily Yeomans was unwell so couldn't take part) came 4th and

qualified. Individual placings saw Anna Warner coming 1st in her arena and Grace Jackson was 6th in hers. At novice level the team of Kitty Ing, Euan Montgomery, Alice Parton and Bella Timmis came 4th with Alice winning her section, Euan and Kitty coming 6th and Bella was 8th. At regional level, the team consisting of Daisy Bethune, Shona Flatley, Dora Prytherch and Lottie Williams came 7th with individual placings for Daisy who came 3rd and Jemima, Shona and Dora all coming 9th in their arenas. All of these individual placings secured them qualification for the Regional Championships.

Sadly due to the wet weather both the Pony Club Championships and the Pony Club Flower Show jumping were cancelled. Fortunately, the Regional Championships at Eland Lodge went ahead where everyone did well and were a credit to the Branch. Special mention must be made of Dora Prytherch who competed at Regional Championships in all three disciplines coming 5th on one of her horses in the eventing competition.

Despite the cancellation of Pony Club Championships, it was decided to continue to hold the national final of the Horse and Pony Care competition and we were fortunate enough to qualify our senior team of Hannah Chappell, Kitty Ing and Lucy Lloyd-Brown who went on to come 7th.

For the third year running, we sent a team to compete in the arena eventing competition at Blenheim. This was an exciting experience for all our competitors having the opportunity to compete at such a prestigious event. The team did very well and had an enjoyable day out.

Congratulations to everyone and a big thank you to all parents for their continued support!

The Pony Club in this Country is split up into 19 areas, North Shropshire Branch is one of 17 branches within Area 7 which stretches from the Welsh border over to Northampton and south to Warwickshire. Each Area holds qualifying competitions for a wide variety of disciplines, both mounted and un-mounted to qualify to compete at The Pony Club Championships in August at Cholmondeley Castle. Very recently a new introductory level has established for dressage, show jumping and eventing called the Regional Competition. Qualifiers for this are held at the various Area competitions with those who qualify competing at a regional championship, which, this year for Area 7, was at Eland Lodge.

### Area Competitions 2020 - Important Information:

If you wish to be considered for any of the area competitions in 2020 please make sure that you and the horse/pony you intend to ride at the competitions have attended 3 rallies. If you attended 2019 summer camp that counts as 1 rally. All rallies after 1st July 2019 count towards the 2020 eligibility, but at least 1 rally must be in 2020. Team training and practice sessions do not count towards this. Helen Elston will once again be collecting the area reply slips from those who wish to be considered and the slips will be available on the website early next year.

The triathlon at Packwood was another successful event making the most of the superb grounds that Packwood has to offer. We had some 60 competitors representing 9 different Branches. North Shropshire was represented by 15 younger member all doing extremely well and having fun.

# Horse and Pony Care by Lucy Lloyd Brown

Looking back at the Pony Club Horse & Pony Care Area Competition in April, when Hannah, Kitty and I competed as the Senior Team it seemed so long ago! I had put away my revision books and all thoughts of the millions of



equine facts I had bouncing around in my head. Then in early October we had a message to say we were going to the Championship finals in 1 weeks' time..... that was a shock! We didn't have time for lots of revision we had to rely on what we already knew and hoped between us we could get that knowledge out.

Since joining the Pony Club, I have gone along to the H&P care rallies and tried to have a go at the competitions as I believed that they were helpful to building up my knowledge of how best to care for my own horses. Care is an important part of owning a horse, it's not as much fun as riding but there could be no riding if you don't know how to care for your horse properly.

In Pony Club whatever point you start at we all learn as we go along, at the various rallies, camps and competitions. We are taught and we observe others around us and hopefully we learn. We absorb knowledge by being around other riders, from seeing and hearing their situations and watching how they progress. We file these things away in our heads, mostly we don't realise we know about something until the situation arises and then all sorts of information pops into our heads.

The amount of information regarding every aspect of keeping, riding and caring for equines is vast and that knowledge is not gained in a short time, it is built up over a whole lifetime. New ideas, old ideas, things often change for the better, but many older remedies still work. After passing my B test and feeling pleased with myself I soon realised it was another big step up as I began working towards my AH test. I realised how much I knew.... and how much I still had to learn! But don't be put off as everyone starts somewhere and in Pony Club the tests are a great structured way to build up your knowledge. I passed my AH test and that was great relief but again it was just a starting point towards a life with equines.

My job, working with lots of top competition horses and ponies, plus any visiting animals, is to care for those animals and help them to be the best they can be. I need to know their normal behaviour, routines, likes and dislikes. I need to be able to look at them and tell if they look "off" colour just because I know how they

normally behave. Do they normally cough, roll, lie down, get warm, feel the cold? How do they have their feed and supplements and medications but also what they are allowed or not according to FEI competition rules? What about any lumps and bumps.... I need to know which ones are old and look for what maybe new and think what caused them and do they give pain? I need to know how and when their legs should be bandaged or not. What bits, bridles, girths do they prefer. Do they like or need to be walked in hand, for how long at what intervals? Does the hay they eat need to be steamed? Do they need a nebuliser, do they want a grill to stop crib biting and wind sucking?

I need to think where any stallions are stalled, it's a good idea not to put them between young mares and some need a high sided pen with electric around the top as they get very excited. Not all stallions are the same though, some are calm and easy to handle but those that are not may need a chifney when being taken out in a head collar. When a stallion has been castrated I need to care for the surgical incisions, check the cuts several times a day, looking for any changes and I can use my mobile telephone to take photographs to send to the vet so we can discuss the care. I routinely work with the vets to calm the horses while they administer injections or see to all sorts of procedures after surgery and other ailments. I am now well versed in the different ways colic may present in horses, with certain symptoms often being present and other symptoms only shown in that certain horse specific to them. I need to know how to combine the different symptoms so that I know when to make that very important call to get the vet out.

When it comes to exercise I have lots of options to use. Depending upon what result we need. Do they go on the walker each day or more often, how long and at what depth should they exercise on the water treadmill for, maybe they should be lunged or put on the walker or maybe they would benefit from being simply turned out in a field? From just broken youngsters to Olympic hopefuls, from Spruce Meadows Champions and International Team Pony Champions I work with them all. Lists on a white board are great but so much else is in my head and somehow it all fits in and every day I learn something more.

If I turn back time and look at myself at 10 when I joined the Pony Club, I would have been amazed at what I know now and wondered how it's possible. Well it happens little by little.... By going to the care sessions and going to camp and by testing yourself at the Area competitions and by completing badges. Eventually it becomes second nature, you just know it, it's in your head and you can thank the Instructors, helpers and parents who shared their knowledge along the way to help your knowledge grow.

# Area Dressage by Anna Warner



On the 20th July the North Shropshire Pony Club hosted the Area Seven Dressage Qualifier at Berriewood Farm.

### Pony Club Triathlons

(Though you only spend a quarter of that doing the activities.) Depending on your age you swim for different amounts of time and run different distances. Also if you are twelve or older you shoot one handed.

### My Pony Club Memories 1965-1974 by Edward Dorrell

With parents who had both ridden all of their lives, it was inevitable that I would sit on a horse before I could walk and then become a member of the Pony Club.

Dad had been a very successful Point to Point rider and was a prominent member of the North Shropshire Hunt. He was Clerk of the Course at Eyton on Severn for many years and also acted as a Point to Point Steward, Starter, Judge and Course Inspector.

Mum had also been a member of the North Shropshire Pony Club so at an early age, I was entrusted into the care of the legendary District Commissioner, the formidable Mrs L. Betts. The North Shropshire Pony Club's activities were centred around the annual Pony Club Meet of the Hunt, Pony Club Rallies, various inter branch social occasions and the annual Party at Baschurch Village Hall. Compulsory attendance at three Rallies was required before entries would be accepted for any Pony Club competitions. They were usually held at members farms and I particularly remember Dickin's of Aston and Barbara Ward at Stoke on Tern . Rallies were an unfortunate inconvenience to a young rider who only wanted to gallop, jump and compete in gymkhanas and hunter trials, and they necessitated Pony, tack and rider to be immaculately turned out for the obligatory Inspection. The remainder of the day would be spent being taught dressage and doing trotting poles and cavalettis. Only years later whilst riding racehorses did I appreciate the necessity for horses to be well schooled and taught to jump properly! Once the rallies were completed the hunter trial/show season began, and with three younger sisters also in the Pony Club, the summer holidays were spent attending multiple events with Mum's famous picnics to sustain us.

I was lucky enough to be selected for the North Shropshire Pony Club One Day Event Team for both the Area Trials and Kinlet. My Pony, Secret, was half thoroughbred, brilliant across country, a little erratic show jumping but would regularly boil over in the dressage and on one occasion I remember cantering through the entire test!

Pony Club Camp at the West Mid Showground was usually at the beginning of the summer holidays and the dangerous recipe of a handful of adolescent boys being mixed with their female counterparts at a ratio of 10:1 produced its own set of problems!

I was appointed as a Line Leader for my last year at camp, and with the sterling help of my assistant Louise Muir my line produced gleaming tack and pristine muck heaps to rival the Household Cavalry and we managed to win the Best Lines Competition. However, all my pocket money was spent employing others to clean my tack and plait my pony!

The same year I was lucky enough to win the Boy's Spur and still feel very grateful for the wonderful opportunities that the Pony Club gave me.

Horses have continued to play a big part of my life and having been a Second Row Forward whilst playing Rugby at School, it was always going to be an uphill struggle to be a jockey. However, with a "strict "diet and some lovely people to ride for, I was able to ride successfully in Hunter Chases and Point to Points for nearly 10 years with the highlights being, finishing 6th behind Grittar in the 1981 Aintree Foxhunters and winning the 1983 North West Area Riders Championship.

Subsequently I was asked to become a Point to Point Steward and Course Inspector and since 1993 have acted as a racecourse Steward at most of the Racecourses in the Midlands and North West. Latterly I have been a member of both the BHA Licensing and Disciplinary Committees and currently serve on the Independent Judicial Panel.

However, some of my best memories and oldest friends were made during those happy days as a member of the North Shropshire Pony Club.
