## IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL MEMBERS 10 and UNDER

If your pony does not have a martingale, make sure you always come to rallies, events etc with a stirrup leather around the pony's neck.

This is for you to hold onto when things do not go right to avoid pulling on your pony's mouth and perhaps to save you from falling off.

#### **SAFETY AT RALLIES**

Please can you all make sure that unless you are riding in a lesson, that you only walk (mounted/dismounted), especially when going from your trailer to the lesson. The car park is a potentially dangerous situation with a lot of ponies, children, dogs etc milling around. It is the responsibility of everyone present to ensure that all measures are taken to safeguard both ponies and people at all times. Please be aware of safety.

**Air jackets:** When an air jacket inflates the sudden noise startles horses in the immediate vicinity thereby causing difficulties for the other members of a ride if used in a group ride in a confined area, e.g., an indoor school or outdoor manège. Air jackets are therefore not encouraged for group rides.

Also, it is your responsibility to pick up any horse droppings and hay in the parking area and in the school – if that is where the lesson is taking place.

#### **TURNOUT**

Would you please all pay careful attention to turnout of yourselves and your pony/horse when attending all Rallies and Training. Please make sure your boots are polished, jodhpurs, tack etc are clean.

Your hair must be tied back securely, in a safe manner to reduce the risk of hair being caught and to prevent scalp injuries. A hairnet is therefore recommended.

The wearing of any sort of jewellery when handling or riding a horse/pony is not recommended and if done at any Pony Club activity, is done at the risk of the member/their parent/guardian. However, to stop any risk of injury, necklaces and bracelets (other than medical bracelets) must be removed, as must larger and more pendulous pieces of jewellery (including those attached to piercings) which create a risk of injury to the body part through which they are secured. For the avoidance of doubt a wristwatch, wedding ring, stock pin worn horizontally and/or a tie clip are permitted. It is recommended that stock pins are removed for cross country.



#### **EMAIL ADDRESSES**

Please ensure you have a current, working email address recorded with us that you also check regularly.

We use email to notify members of rallies/training, times and upcoming events, as well as the **Facebook Group**.

#### PARENTS & MEMBERS PLEASE NOTE: STIRRUPS

Ensure that your stirrups and boots fit correctly. For very good safety reasons, Pony Club rules require the following: "Standard riding or jodhpur boots with a fairly thin, smooth sole and a well-defined square cut heel" and "Stirrups should be of the correct size to suit the rider's boots. There must be 7mm (1/4") clearance on either side of the boot".

These rules together with the requirement not to wear other unsuitable footwear including boots and stirrups with interlocking treads, are there to minimise the risk of the foot becoming caught in the stirrup in a fall which can cause very serious injuries. If you are buying new boots check the size of stirrups with the new boots.

At competitions this is probably the most common problem picked up by tack checkers. We will be checking this at our MADs over the winter and will advise you if your stirrups are the wrong size, but please also check yourself.

If you go to a Pony Club competition with incorrect size stirrups, you may not be allowed to take part.



#### BADGES/TIES/SWEATSHIRTS/JACKETS

These are always kept in stock; please contact me. If you need The Pony Club Manual of Horsemanship these can be purchased from Amazon – a must if you are taking Tests.

Medical Arm Bands are no longer compulsory wear, but it is still recommended that one is worn.

#### **NEW SPURS RULE**

#### The Pony Club has reviewed its spurs policy and introduced the following change:

Members wishing to use spurs as an aid for enhanced rider-to-horse communication must now demonstrate both a thorough understand of spurs and their proper use, as well as a secure lower leg position while riding.



#### **Rule Change**

From 1 January 2025, riders who want to wear spurs must have successfully completed the C+ Riding Test or the updated Spurs Test.

In order to easily identify if a Member is able to wear spurs a yellow hat tag will be introduced, and it will be available as soon as possible.

Petersfield Pony Club are planning on running a Spurs Test in the Christmas holidays.



Combined Training is Dressage followed by Showjumping; the results are combined to find the winner.


It will be open to all ages and levels, from Pony Club Walk & Trot Test with cross poles to Pony Club Intermediate Test and 90cm+ showjumping.





#### THE PONY CLUB JCB NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS | TETRATHLON $\dots$ ... TRINITY CLEMENT

e arrived at the ICB Championships on Thursday 8 August for my first Tet Champs as an Intermediate.

After we were settled in, I had a practice shoot in the evening which went well, preparing me for the start of the competition the next day.

The shoot was early on the Friday morning. It wasn't my best shoot but put me in a strong spot for the rest of the competition. We had the swim that afternoon which is my strongest element. Although I didn't swim a PB, it was enough to put me in first place overnight.

On the Saturday we had the ride which was a full up 1m and very technical track. Florida was feeling good, but an early mistake gave us a few penalties which dropped us down the rankings, however, I was really pleased with how she jumped and coped with the tough course.

The run was early on the Sunday morning. It was a hilly course which I enjoyed and even had a water element which was fun! In the end I ended up coming **EIGHTH** overall. Although it wasn't the result I hoped for, I learnt a lot for my first year as an Intermediate and look forward to trying to improve on that next year!





#### THE PONY CLUB ICB NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS | DRESSAGE & CHAIRMAN'S CUP EVENTING ...

... ELODIE ASHBY RUDD

have been lucky enough to go to PC Champs before so have an idea of what's involved - but this year presented new challenges!

Before I could even go to Champs, I had to qualify. The Eventing Qualifier was at Hambledon. It was a step up for Elvis and I – definitely the biggest height we had done at that time with a Novice Eventing Test, 105cm xc and 110cm SJ.

Despite very wet conditions, Elvis did amazingly, and I was super proud of our double clear with a really solid dressage, and ultimately a **WIN!** It was an amazing experience as it was my first eventing win on Elvis.

Not only did I qualify for the Chairman's Cup eventing but also, I qualified for the Novice Dressage which was particularly pleasing as dressage is usually our weakest phase.

Preparing for Champs is a big job! Working out what we need (how much feed, hay, bedding for him, our food and bedding, plenty of clothes etc and then fitting it all in). This was definitely a bit stressful!

It was a very early wake up on Wednesday to travel up to Offchurch Bury for the first competition – the Novice Dressage. Once we'd found our 'camping' spot, we had to quickly unpack and get Elvis ready for the Dressage. No time to waste! I was nervous - not so much in the skill of the Test but the Championship atmosphere can change how



the horses behave and respond. Warm up proved interesting with Elvis soaking up the Championship atmosphere and thinking that two legs were better than four! Luckily, he managed to keep it together for the Test but was a little tense and distracted by the Dressage To Music which was running alongside. Even with all of this going on he still managed a pretty solid 67.7% which I was very pleased with.

Stable prepared and kit organised, I hopped back on Elvis later that day to give him a stretch of legs and schooled around the Chairman's Cup Test. It's hard work for the horses to be stabled for so long, so whether hand grazing, a quick hack or school, I try to do something each end of the day when not competing to help them not get stiff.

The Chairman's Cup is a three-day event with a trot up and Dressage on the first day, XC on the second day and SJ on the last day. So, for our second morning I was up very early for a quick ride just to stretch his legs before getting show ready for the trot up. This involved cleaning his legs as well as plaiting him and finally doing his quarter markings – this is to check the horses are sound. Elvis flew through the trot up, so we were signed off to compete! After a busy morning it was time to relax for a few hours before our Dressage later that day.

Elvis warmed up so well for our Dressage Test. This pro attitude carried on through to the Test as he was able to score a 32.4 in the hardest test we had ever done (equivalent to a 2\* Eventing Test). It was such an amazing moment as I was not only able to see how far we had come but also a taste of the future with him nailing some complicated moves! After settling Elvis back in his stable it was time to walk the XC course.

I was very nervous as it was technical and big. However, I really trust Elvis and know he is so confident around XC – I wouldn't want to be on anyone else for my first time at this height! Walking that course, I decided that there was one jump that I was going to take the learner option. A hard decision, but the fence was huge with a big ditch in front of it, and this round had to be confidence building for us both.



XC day came – excitement was high and I was up early to feed, muck out and give Elvis a leg stretch. I walked the lines of the combinations again to be sure of my route. I had a late time, so spent the day helping my friends and other members of the Pony Club. It was soon time to get ready. I went back to the lorry and got into my PC colours.

I took everything I would need down to the stables - tack, studs, ice boots for after XC etc. A final check of studs, tack and my kit, it was time to get on. Made sure that I put the right studs in. Make sure that his tack and boots were on nicely. Then it was time to get on.

It was quite a hack down to the XC start – only to be told on arrival there was a 45 minute delay. I hopped off, loosened his girth and grackle and chatted to the other competitors. When the class started, I hopped back on, walked him around to warm up his body and then trotted and cantered him making sure I got off his back into 2-point position. A couple of warm up jumps and then it was time to go.



I walked to the start box and started my watch when the starter told me 10 seconds till, I could go. Then I was off. Elvis gave me the best feeling the whole way round going clear (with the learner option). It was an unbeatable feeling crossing the finish line – I was so happy and very proud. I hopped off, and immediately went into wash off mode as it was quite a hot day so super important to untack and get boots off. ice boots on and cool him down.

That evening, I took Elvis on long walks to help avoid stiffness and put cooling gel on his legs to make sure that they don't swell up. The final morning was Showjumping day. I fed, walked and hand grazed him I went and walked my Showjumping course. It was quite technical, but I liked the course – it definitely needed to be ridden

accurately. A quick hack to stretch out, and then the waiting game for the showjumping!

The SJ times were in reverse order, and I was in the middle of the leaderboard, so I went in the middle of the class. Elvis warmed up nicely then we were off. The arena was right in front of the retail and food areas, a huge atmosphere with lots of people watching. I had to make sure that I reassured Elvis and made him feel very confident. He flew round the Showjumping course and did a lovely clear (the first clear of the morning!) so I was very, very pleased.

It was a lovely way to finish a fantastic few days at Pony Club Champs.



PC Champs is a huge event – so much fun and lots to do. I loved being part of it and want to thank my parents and PPC for helping it happen!

Elodie failed to mention that she and Elvis finished an incredible 27<sup>th</sup> in a huge field of 57! Very well done!
