What are you letting yourself in for?

The Basics....

For the second year running, the Gibson & Young Family welcome SPC members 8 years and under to bring their pony to Mini Camp at Glaisters Farm, Kirkgunzeon on the 4th of July until midday on the 5^{th} of July. To find us follow sat nav for postcode DG2 8JT then keep left and follow the concrete road to the top of the hill. Glaisters Farm steading is at the end of the road. Some of you will know it as the Christmas Tree Farm if you have visited to collect a tree in December.

At Glaisters we are able to provide basic serviced accommodation for groups of 2 or 3 per room up to 18 campers in total - with ample permanent toilets/showers and kitchen/dining facilities. For each of our four legged campers we provide temporary indoor stabling with room for all ponies and tack to be housed under one roof. This means if the weather isn't kind the show can still go on in a safe, sheltered and well supervised area.

On each whole day we aim to pack in 2 rides, 1 stable management session, 3 meals, a planned evening activity and some all-important free time for catching up with friends. We guarantee you won't be without something to do...

Most of your riding will take place in a field a short traffic-free ride away from Camp HQ ideal distance for warming up and cooling down after a busy coaching session. We will have 2 short dressage arenas, one long arena, a showjumping area and a larger undulating area for practising XC techniques. In the other direction from HQ there is endless off-road riding available in the Xmas Tree plantations for a wind-down session or even some fast

For your peace of mind, we can guarantee the following:

Fully supervised stabling and camping, with resident Camp Manager and camp mums/dads. All meals, snacks and drinks included (and any special dietary requirements catered for) provided by a dedicated team of parents. Friendly, level- assessed instruction for riding and horse and pony care sessions by experienced, qualified coaches. Entertainment, including a campfire (subject to weather), rounders and a BBQ! Get ready to have some fun!

The most essential part of a great camp: the helpers.

Parents, family, friends, we need you!

Camp doesn't happen without the help of our parents, family and friends. There are 4 roles that we need help with each day. These are outlined below to give you an idea of what the responsibilities and time commitments are for each as they would apply to big camp. However, as we expect most mini-campers to have a parent or other responsible adult present with them for the duration we won't look to formally allocate these - we know you'll all just muck-in.

This year we will be inviting all parents to a pre-camp meeting where, amongst other things, we can furnish you with more details and answer your questions relating to any of the helper roles. This will be held at Clann in Kirkcudbright on the evening of 19th June 2024 by kind permission of Lesley Thompson.

Although this part of the meeting will be aimed at the parents of our big campers it will give you the heads-up for next year or perhaps you might even be encouraged to put your name down to help for big camp, this year, and see for yourself. We will put each roll up on our signup.com page so that everyone can see what the roles are, what you have volunteered for and what we still need help with. A link will be circulated once all roles are created

If you think your strengths lie elsewhere – no problem! We are also on the look-out for any parents who see themselves more as entertainers or for whom chaperoning a ride holds less than no interest at all?! Perhaps you'd rather support Camp by volunteering your time to provide a completely non-pony related evening activity. We're all about balance.

Last year we had a quiz, rounders and an orienteering evening. So please have a think and let us know if there is anything you'd like to put forward as an idea or can help with.

Family Helper Roles During Camp – The Glue. We need you.....

Night Shift. We need 3 parents/guardians to be resident each overnight from 6pm - 8am. Main responsibilities:

- 1. Overseeing evening activities
- 2. Enforcing Bedtime Routine
- 3. Ensuring that campers stay safe after lights out.
- 4. Waking up Campers.

Morning Shift. We need 2 parents each day from 8am until 1pm. Main Responsibilities:

- 1. Serving Breakfast
- 2. Chaperone Ride
- 3. Serving AM Snack
- 4. Serving Lunch

Afternoon Shift. We need 2 parents each day from 1pm – 6pm. Main responsibilities:

- 1. Chaperoning PM Ride
- 2. Serving PM Snack
- 3. Preparing & Serving Dinner

At mini-camp it is our expectation that a a parent/carer stays overnight with their child and is present for the duration so all will muck in to cover these jobs.

In addition to these essential roles we are looking for willing Senior Pony Club Members and Others Enthusiastic people who can come in and help to organise games and other activities for Members once the riding has ended.

Pastoral Care:

Resident, On-Duty and first point of contact for the duration of mini Camp. Responsible for the general discipline, rules, child protection, catering and all the domestic aspects of camp life. Qualified First Aider.

Stable Manager:

Sam Barrick: 07528099451

Responsible for all stabling arrangements, reporting to Chief Instructor. Manages the supply of hay and bedding, muck heap, mucking out and all safety precautions. Checks the health and wellbeing of all the animals in the stables and in consultation with Chief Instructor calls the vet if necessary. Holds a veterinary first aid kit and the camp farrier's phone number.

Chief Instructor:

Justine Hunter-Brown

Responsible for assessing the ability of minicampers and their ponies to provide the appropriate tuition whilst ensuring that health and safety policies are adhered to.

District Commissioner:

Sarah Burton: 07990550040

Ultimate responsibility. Should only be contacted during camp in an emergency if unable to get hold of Sam.

Caterers

The most important helpers? Discuss....

Each day we will need 2-3 parent helpers to prepare and serve an evening meal as part of the afternoon shift. The food may be prepared on site or delivered each day by parents according to a pre-determined menu.

It is important that all caterers have and are aware of the appropriate hygiene certificates / standards necessary to store, prepare and serve food at camp.

For Mini Camp we will be looking to resident parents to set up and serve Lunch & Breakfast and support the resident BBQ-er in the evening.

As always donations of homebaking and snacks will be gratefully received to sustain the kids between meals (and the farmer).

Camp Rules!

Mobile Phones & Other Devices



There is 100% ban for all campers on bringing any mobile phones, cameras or other screened devices to Pony Club Camp

Following feedback from Camp 2023 it has been decided that we must enforce a policy on devices to ensure the safety and security of all campers. Therefore there is a 100% ban, for all campers, on mobile phones, cameras or any other devices that can record, upload or download material.

It is our hope that camp will provide more than enough for our campers to be busy with without the need for devices.

Photography

Mark Burton will be at camp to ensure that there are plenty of photographs of all the campers during their stay. These will be circulated to all parents and campers following camp.

Keeping in Touch

If you will find it difficult not to be in touch with your children during camp there are a couple of options:

- 1. Helper Spots: Please look at the jobs that we need parents to help with during camp and sign up so that you can catch up at the same time as helping make camp great.
- 2. Sam Barrick: Sam is the first point of contact during camp and our lead on pastoral care, so if you or your child do need to get in touch with each other then please speak to Sam, drop Sam a message or call her if it is urgent. If you think your child may be homesick, please talk to Sam to discuss how you would like us to handle the situation, should it occur.

Welfare & Child Protection

If there are any issues that you think we need to know about to ensure the welfare & safety of your child, you must contact our Safeguarding and Welfare Officer – Julie McCulloch on 07724999460. All information will be treated in strictest confidence.

Medication & Medical Conditions

We must be informed of all medical conditions and any medication needs. This information will be collected via our camp forms - please disclose fully.

Emergency Contacts

All Campers will need to provide two 24/7 emergency contacts. These contacts must be able to take important decisions for your child and your horse/pony.



Please provide details of medication requirements.



On arrival your pony must be checked by Sam Barrick prior to unloading.... You won't be expected to wear tweed!

Pony Health & Welfare

Dos & Don'ts

Before Camp;

- 1. Ensure your pony is up to date with Flu & Tetanus vaccinations according to PC rules. You must present passport prior to unloading your pony at camp.
- 2. Make sure your pony is fit enough to manage the workload of camp.
- 3. If you have any concerns about your horse or pony's health or soundness please get it checked by your vet. If in doubt, do not bring it to camp.
- 4. Make sure your horse/pony's feet are well trimmed or shod in advance.

If there are any health issues with your horse that we feel require the services of a vet, we will try to contact you first. If we are unable to contact you we will contact your nominated veterinary practice. If neither you or your vet are contactable we will contact our own vet and you will be liable for the associated costs.

Please do not bring any horse or pony to camp who is showing any signs of infectious disease. This list is not exhaustive, but you must not bring any horse or pony with a cough, nasal discharge, ocular discharge, ringworm, unexplained swellings.

ON ARRIVAL DO NOT UNLOAD YOUR HORSE OR PONY UNTIL SAM BARRICK HAS HEALTH CHECKED IT

Health & Safety



Health & Safety is a priority in organising camp and we need parents and campers to play their part.

Health & Safety

Rules & Expectations for a safe and enjoyable camp.



Be familiar with your PC theory and use what you have learnt.

There are a number of camp rules in place to ensure that children remain safe and supervised not only whilst working with horses, but also when using the facilities provided and staying overnight. Please talk to your children about these rules ahead of camp and ensure that they understand the expectations.

Briefing: Shortly after arrival there will be a briefing for all campers. Health & Safety rules will form an important part of this and all campers should pay close attention and do their best to follow the rules set out for the duration of camp. But to give you a headstart some of the main ones, which can bear repetition, are listed here.

General:

- 1. Know the rules and if in doubt, ask.
- 2. Pay attention to which areas you are allowed access to and do not enter any other areas.
- 3. Glaisters is a working farm and someone's home please leave gates as you find them.
- 4. ALL dogs must be kept on leads.

Yard:

- 1. No access to stable area without appropriate footwear.
- 2. No access to stable area outwith scheduled hours.
- 3. Stabling is allocated on arrival no switching unless at the direction of the Stable Manager Sam Barrick.
- 4. If you see something that you think might be dangerous or become dangerous do not be a hero! Tell an adult helper immediately.

Overnight:

- 1. Rooms will be allocated. You must not swap unless directed by Sam Barrick.
- 2. Your camp timetable will stipulate an agreed curfew. Between these hours you must remain in your allocated sleeping area. You are only permitted to leave your sleeping accommodation to go directly to Sam. Sam will make sure that you all know where to find her if you need her.
- 3. Be kind and considerate to each other.

PARENTS, PLEASE ENSURE YOUR CHILDREN ARE FULLY AWARE OF THE OVERNIGHT RULES. ANYONE WILLFULLY IGNORING THESE WILL BE ASKED TO LEAVE CAMP.

Camp Clothing

Each year we choose a colour for our official camp clothing. Camp clothing will be supplied by Rostrum Sportswear and will be available to purchase in advance. You will be notified by text message to let you know where and when you can put your order in.

Tack and turnout - things to know, things to check.

Rider Dress Code

The Pony Club Dress Code is summarised on our branch website and the expectation at camp is that riding dress will be as per the dress code for rallies:

- Clothing When mounted,
 Members should wear a Branch
 sweatshirt, plain-coloured
 jodhpurs, a suitable plain-coloured
 polo shirt.
- Footwear Only standard riding or jodhpur boots with a fairly smooth, thin sole and a well defined square cut heel may be worn. Plain black or brown half chaps may be worn with jodhpur boots of the same colour. No other footwear will be permitted.
- **Jewellery** No jewellery must be worn.

- **Hair** Must be tied back securely in a hairnet, if necessary.
- Hats and Body Protectors These are to be in accordance with guidance and meet recommended Safety Standards as detailed in the Rulebooks.

Some of these items have safety implications and attention must be given to any applicable standards and their condition on the day. Hats must be tagged to show that they meet the current PC standards and body protectors although not required for activities other than XC are still recommended. If used these must meet the current PC standards. Gloves are not a requirement but are recommended for riding and handling. Hoodies are a popular clothing item but we wish to remind you that hooded clothing should not be worn for riding.

In the event of warm weather (yes please) riders need not wear their sweatshirts and a shirt or polo shirt is fine as long as it covers the shoulders as a minimum.



Stewartry Sweatshirts are currently available for purchase from Wainwrights Screenprints or contact Kirsty regarding pre-loved sweatshirts.

And for your pony.....

The emphasis here is mainly on safety.

- Plain, dark coloured correctly fitting tack
- Numnahs / Saddle Cloth Any solid colour is permitted.
 Contrasting piping is permitted.
- For safety reasons leather bridles are recommended.
- Humane girths are not permitted. A humane girth is described as having nonindependent straps that will loosen if one of the straps was to break.
- All tack should be in a good state of repair - check the condition and the stitching regularly.

- Tack should be cleaned and checked weekly and also before each rally.
- Stirrups should be of the correct size to suit the rider's boots.

 They must have 7mm (¼") clearance on either side of the boot. Note stirrups which connect the boot and the stirrup magnetically are not allowed and interlocking boot soles and stirrup treads are not allowed
- Grass reins and balanced support reins are permitted at Pony Club rallies and competitions jumping up to 50cm or Walk and Trot Tests.

A word on whips What to use and how to use it

SJ & XC Whip:

- The maximum length of the "Whip" is 70cm and must be no less than 45cm.
- The "Contact area", is considered to be 2/5's (two fifths) of the overall length of the "Whip" and must be covered with a "Pad".
- There must be no "binding" within 17 centimetres of the end of the "Pad".
- The "Pad" must be smooth, with no protrusion or raised surface, and be made of shock absorbing material throughout its circumference such that it gives a compression factor of at least 6mm.
- There is to be no wording, advertising or personalisation of any kind on the "Pad".

A word on Spurs

May be worn at Rallies and other events. Sharp spurs are not permitted. Only blunt spurs, without rowels or sharp edges, and spurs that have a smooth rotating ball on the shank may be worn. If the spurs are curved, the curve must be downwards and the shank must point straight to the back and not exceed 4cm in length. The measurement is taken from the boot to the end of the shank.

- Spurs must only be used to enhance the normal leg aids and allow for better communication from rider to horse.
- Spurs must never be used to vent a competitor's anger or to reprimand the horse.
- Use of the spurs which causes injury e.g. blood, broken skin or a weal, is always classed as misuse.

Dressage Whip may be of any length.

At all times, the whip must only be used:

- For a good reason, as an aid to encourage the horse forward.
- At an appropriate time, namely when the horse is reluctant to go forward under normal aids of seat and legs.
- In the right place, namely down the shoulder or behind the leg but never overarm.
- With appropriate severity.
- No more than twice for any one incident

Arriving at Camp – 9am Thursday 4th July

Trailer Parking

Prior to arrival at Glaisters Farm please take a look at the site layout so you can see where you are heading with your trailers & trucks.



On arrival follow signage to trailer parking. You will be stopped at 'check-in' as you pass the stables and asked to register with Sam. From there follow arrows to parking and form two rows facing the direction of exit.

<u>Please can all riders and their ponies arrive</u> dressed & ready to tack up and go.

On arrival:

- 1. Register your arrival with Sam (Stable Manager) at 'check-in' as you pass Stabling DO NOT UNLOAD YOUR PONY. Sam will check your paperwork, health check your pony and give you stable, room & tack spot details.
- 2. **Park your trailer** see picture for directions. You may leave trailer at your own risk.
- 3. Prepare your stable & unload pony
 Check bedding, hang haynet and
 provide water before settling your
 pony in.
- 4. Unload Tack & Feeding each camper will have a numbered barrier for holding their saddle and the 2 cubicles on either side for kit & feed.
- 5. Unload Campers & Parents
 Overnight Kit Sam will have
 given you a room number. Check
 out the bunk room picture to find
 it. Make your bed with your own
 fitted sheet over the top of existing
 sheets and bring your own sleeping
 bag and pillow.
- 6. Ready to ride 10am



Departure Instructions Friday 5th July:

0900: Campers & their parents will be prompted to pack up their rooms before breakfast.

1000: Campers to be ready to ride and stables ready to vacate.

1145: Campers will return direct to trailers to be untacked & loaded up.

1200: Snack/Juice & Camp Awards outside HQ if dry and at the stables if

1230: All Trailers to have left Glaisters. This is important so that the road is clear for Big Campers on their way in.

Tidy Up Jobs

Tidy up jobs:

- 1. Rooms. Please ensure that rooms are left ready for big campers: toilets flushed; your own sheets removed; rubbish removed; and lights off.
- 2. Kitchen, Dining Room,
 Communal Toilets: As we go
 along we will all muck-in to ensure
 that facilities remain tidy for the
 next camp.
- 3. Stables and Tack Area: Ideally this area should be vacated when the campers are ready to ride out: ensure stables are clean; sweep back bedding; remove hay and water.

Camp Awards

At Mini - Camp there are 2 awards given:

- 1. Best Mini Camper
- 2. Certificate of Completion

The Camp Awards will be held once camp has been tidied up and ponies loaded at around 12.00pm

Each Camper will be put into a team for the Tetrathlon Activities on the Thursday. Throughout the activities points will be accumulated for your team. Points will be totalled up and the winning team announced at the BBQ on Thursday night.
